INTERNET RESOURCE GUIDE

THERAPY RESOURCES:

www.timeforkids.com/TFK: The site provides trivia, rabbit racer game (arcade style game), and questions from the magazine. Useful for children who are reading TFK and/or Grades 4 and up.

www.americangirl.com: For Grades 2 and up. Under the Play On-Line icon there are matching games and dressing games related to the characters from American Girls books.

www.sikids.com/index.html: Under the Sport icon there are different sports (arcade) games, finding games, and wrestling games. Some of the games are time. (Grades 2 and up)

www.nationalgeographic.com/kids: This site provides word search and arcade style games that relate to current or previous articles. (Grades 2 and up)

www.fekids.com/kln/games/whomp: Whomp is similar to the game 'Boggle' and is appropriate for grades 2 and up.

www.crickweb.co.uk/ks2literacy.html: This site is designed for students in pre-K through the 4th Grade. It also correlates with the White Board program. It has games such as hangman, categorization, and numbers.

www.ingles.it/eggs.htm: The game consists of making up sentences with the words listed in a given time. Levels vary but starts at Grade 2.

www.abc.net.au/children/games/default.htm: This site consists of dress up games and board games that are modified. The games are appropriate for ages 2 and up.

www.abc.net.au/children/bananas/games/animal_sounds/default.htm: There are a variety of games from *Bananas in Pajamas* book series. The site states that the level is appropriate for ages 2-6 and contains three levels of difficulty. Additional sound games and labeling are also on the site.

www.kidsplanet.org/games/js/whoami.html: The site contains a listening game for pre-K to K. It presents night time sounds (such as crickets) and you have to guess what animal it is.

www.buildabear.com/play/default.aspx?pageID=games: The site is from the Build-A-Bear company which gives different games such as baseball, dress up, and matching. Levels vary starting from K to 4th Grade.

www.dressupgames.com/index.html: There are a variety of dress up games as well as make-up games (with celebrities such as Miley Cyrus and Rihanna). Decorating cakes games are also

available. Levels vary starting from 2nd Grade and up.

www.eduplace.com/kids/games.jsp: Go to the Student Icon and then to the Games Icon. There will be four games consisting of different levels (K-8th). There is a Geography, Spelling, and Vocabulary.

www.mrpicassohead.com/create.html: Mr. Picasso Head is similar to Mr. Potato Head. You can add different colors, size, and shapes to the head to create you own masterpiece.

www.readwritethink.org/materials/in_the_bag/index.html: It is a guessing game. Clues are given and you have to guess what's in the bag. It's appropriate for K through Grade3.

http://www.mape.org.uk/activities/sorting_games/index.htm: There are nine sorting games. For example, the Fairy Tales Game asks questions about a particular story. They are mostly yes or no questions. It's appropriate for Grades 2 and up.

www.earobics.com/gamegoo/goeeylo.html: The game is composed of listening to questions and asking questions about pictures presented. It's appropriate for Grades 1 and up.

www.britishcouncil.org/kids.htm: The games mostly consists of labeling pictures and putting sentences in order. The games vary in age but starts in Pre-K.

www.studystack.com: Go under the Speech Therapy icon. It gives you three choices of games (e.g. easy opposites). Under easy opposites you can play hangman, crossword, word search, unscramble, flash card, etc that relates to the topic. The easy opposite game was the best choice. The site provides registration and you can create your own study stacks and add data to new ones.

flashcardexchange.com/tag/spelling: The site gives a comprehensive list of card set titles, if you go into silent letter words and click on the icon "Study" it gives 31 silent words as well as spelling rules. The presentation is given in a flashcard system and is appropriate for Grades 3 and up.

www.dotolearn.com/picturecards/printcards/index.htm: Under the Songs and Games icon there are songs about bus, fire, mall, and street safeties as well as "Parts of Me". Some Games include emotions, sequencing, word, color and numbers, and sound sing-a-longs. It is designed for grades k-2 depending on song and activities.

www.kidsdomain.com/holiday/index.html: Under the Games icon, go to Mom Games. There are 10 "Mom Games" that are interactive games, arcade style games, and including puzzle games like soccer smash. These games are appropriate varying for each game but starts at Grade 2.

www.berenstainbears.com: The site consists of dressing up the members of the Berenstain bears, some videos, and also with interactive story book. It is appropriate for Grades 1-2.

www.hasbro.com: Press the Play icon to find games and videos. There are a variety of comic characters such as the Hulk, Spiderman. Under each character you can play a game or watch videos play. The site also includes Creativity Games like building a Boutique, making Friendship Bracelets, and Puzzles. A variety of arcade style games are also available. This site is designed for K to Grade 4, depending on each game.

www.fisher-price.com/us: Select the Fun and Family Time icon. This site is designed for infant-preschool (but could go up to Grade 1). It includes animals playing instruments, phonics games, asteroid attack game, and online puzzles.

disney.go.com/index: A large selection of games and activities based on Disney Movies such as High School Music Stuff, Snow White, etc.

www.storyplace.org: This site is a bilingual site however it only provides one story, “Little Red High Tops”.

www.magickeys.com/books/index.html: The site provides links to E-books, however most of them require either a membership or a fee.

www.americanfolklore.net: The site provides stories about each state, as well as children's stories and Canadian and Mexican folklore.

www.storylineonline.net : The site provides a variety of books read by actors including Elijah Wood and Hillary Duff. (Grades 1-3)

starfall.com: The site provides a variety of stories ranging in levels (from beginners to Grade 2) and the stories also provide audio help.

www.aesopfables.com: The site provides a list consisting of some of Aesop's Fables. There are also audio and images accessible in some of the stories.

www.magickeys.com: Under Children's Storybooks the site provides different levels of online stories ranging from young children to young adults (no audio).
